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AACDD 2011 events will be a celebration of creativity and innovation by members of the African & African-Caribbean Diasporas living and working in the UK, artists and artisans from Africa and the Caribbean as well as work from British and international AACDD partner organisations.

Coinciding with the London Design Festival in September, the main focus of the African & African-Caribbean Design Diaspora Festival 2011 will be the series of individually curated exhibitions, installations and events at the Bargehouse Building opposite the Oxo Tower on the Southbank.

The AACDD - Bargehouse Festival will be launched officially on September 8th with an evening preview for the press.

The exhibitions will be open to the public September 9th - 25th 2011, opening times to be confirmed.

The three-week Festival also coincides with the highly popular Southbank (Mayor's Thames) Festival on the weekend of September 10/11th.

'Below the Surface'

A youth led community arts project and exhibition

"Below the surface" is a photographic project shedding light on the real life in African and African-Caribbean communities in London, the life below the surface of public perception.

Young people from various areas, communities and backgrounds in London, including young offenders and those at risk of social exclusion, will be given the task to document one day of his/her life with a disposable camera.

The end result will be a large scale photographic exhibition, a collage of life's colourful facets within the African and African-Caribbean communities in London.
